
## FIRE DEPT BARBECUE THANK YOU "LOVE THAT CHICKEN"

## Summertime Safety Tips from the Rushville Hose Co.

It's possible to enjoy a sizzling-hot summer without getting burned! When the time comes to haul out the gas grill and camping equipment, jump in the pool, or enjoy some fireworks gives some thought to this advice:

**Grilling:** Keep barbecue grills far away from anything that can burn; your home, cars, dry vegetation, etc. Stay with the grill when lighted, and keep


children and pets away. When barbecuing, protect yourself by wearing a heavy apron and an oven mitt that fits high up over your forearm. Barbecue grills must never be used inside the home because of the fire hazard and the grill can easily cause carbon monoxide poisoning. For charcoal



grills, only use starter fluids, designed for barbecue grills; never use gasoline. Use a limited amount of starter fluid before lighting the fire. If the fire is too slow, rekindle with dry kindling and add more charcoal if necessary. Don't add liquid fuel to re-ignite or build up a fire, as flash fires can result. Soak the coals with water before discarding and leave the grill away from the house until completely cool. For gas grills, always store the gas cylinder outside, away from structures, and turn off the valves when not in use. Check frequently for any leaks in connections by using a soap and water mix that will show bubbles if gas escapes. When purchasing a gas grill, select one that bears the mark of an independent testing laboratory. Follow manufacturer's instructions and if needed, have it repaired by a trained professional.

Fireworks: The safest way to enjoy fireworks is to attend an outdoor public display put on by professionals. Pyrotechnic devices (better known as fireworks) are designed to burn and explode, and are a leading cause of injuries in the U.S. Every year, fireworks used by amateurs cause thousands of injuries serious enough to require emergency room treatment. Children between the ages of 10 and 14 are at greatest risk of injury from fireworks. Even sparklers, often had mistaken as safe, burn as hot as 1200 degrees Fahrenheit. Leave any area where amateurs (adults included) are using these devices, and do not pick up or touch found fireworks.

**Enjoying Your Pool:** Liquid and solid chlorine-based oxidizers are commonly sold for home pool care as hydrogen chloride products. These chemicals can spontaneously combust if

Camping: Pitch your tent (flame retardant is best) well away from your campfire. Only use flashlights or battery-powered lanterns inside the tent or any other closed space, as opposed to liquid-fueled heaters or lanterns. In addition to the fire hazard posed by liquid-fueled devices,

carbon monoxide poisoning can easily result in unvented spaces. Build your campfire downwind, away from your tent, clearing away all dry vegetation and digging a pit surrounded by rocks. Look for signs that warn of potential fire hazards in national forests and campgrounds, and always obey park service regulations. Pour water over or cover the fire with dirt before going to sleep or leaving the campsite. Store liquid fire starter -- NEVER use gasoline -- away from your tent and campfire and use only dry kindling

to freshen a campfire - not liquid fuel. By following these quick and simple steps, we can all keep summer activities fun and fire safe.

house where Dr. Bryant lived. He was the Doctor who began teaching Marcus Whitman how to be a medical doctor. They then heard of the history of the Opera House above Federal Hollow store, how the Masonic Lodge building had been built on the corner of Main and Gilbert Streets and later moved in one piece to where it is now. They next journeyed to the Congregational Church and learned about the 2 men who are honored by monuments in the front yard. Then to the corner of Railroad and Main Street to see where Marcus Whitman's house used to be.

They then were given a tour of the Rushville Fire House and equipment by Ken Seeling and then back to the Valley building.

# SWIMMING POOLS and OTHER REQUIRED PERMITS By: Code Officer Reggie O'Hearn

It is that time of year again of wanting a swimming pool to cool of in, for your benefit please take notice that ANY swimming pool over 2 feet high requires a permit and inspections. Swimming pools require inspections to meet the New York State Building Code. Also be aware that the inflatable swimming pools sold in stores do not meet State Code and need additional items such as fencing 48" high with a latching gate. The swimming pools with plastic sides do not meet the requirement for a strong sided pool, as metal above ground pools do, to meet the height requirement of 48" so they would have to be fenced with a latching gate. In addition any filter pump or electric installed in connection with a pool needs an electrical inspection from a UL electrical inspector. Swimming pools also have to meet the Zoning regulations for the location of a pool. Also please check for other permit requirements like roofing, siding, heating systems, hot water tanks, etc. In the event someone doesn't obtain the required permits for their project and is found not to have a permit there is an additional fee of \$50.00 for not obtaining a permit. To find out the different types of permits required you may pick up a pamphlet from the Village Clerk. For any questions please contact me at the Village Office.
