“Come See What We’re All About!”

The Rushville Fire Department will be opening its doors to area residents, so they can learn about what it takes to be a volunteer firefighter in their community, as part of a statewide program called *Recruit NY*. Over the last several years, it has been very tough for many fire departments throughout New York State to recruit and retain volunteers for a variety of reasons. Like most volunteer fire departments, the Rushville Hose Company needs to bolster its emergency responder numbers, so it can continue to provide the optimum level of protection for its residents and fire district. *Now more than ever, we need more of our neighbors joining our fire department.*

On **Saturday, April 9th from 11:00 am to 2:00 pm** the Rushville Hose Company located at 14 Railroad Avenue in Rushville will join in an initiative with volunteer fire departments all across the state, at their respective firehouses, for a unified recruitment drive, as part of National Volunteer Week 2011. Not only will *Recruit NY* be an opportunity to highlight the duties and rewards that come with being a volunteer firefighter, it will also raise public awareness about the need for volunteers. The hope is that a collaborative effort among volunteer fire departments statewide will turn the declining number of volunteer firefighters around.

“Come on out and join us for this unique recruitment day at our firehouse,” said Bill Gardner, President of the Rushville Hose Company. “This is a great opportunity for our neighbors to observe the exciting tasks of a firefighter. Our current members love what they do; they are everyday heroes who help neighbors in need. We hope our recruitment day will inspire other area residents to join our fire service family.”

During the event on April 9th members will conduct tours of the station and firefighter apparatus, allow visitors to try on turnout gear, and provide activities and stations throughout the firehouse for visitors to participate in. The fire department will discuss the requirements to be a volunteer, as well as conduct demonstrations, answer questions, and let visitors know how to get involved in the fire department.



Volunteer firefighters and EMS personnel do important and challenging work for the pure satisfaction of helping others. They are essential for a number of reasons, including the fact that volunteers live in the communities in which they serve which enhances response times, and they save taxpayers millions of dollars every year!

The Firemen’s Association of the State of New York (FASNY) worked in conjunction with the New York State Association of Fire Chiefs, Association of Fire Districts of New York State, Volunteer Fire Police Association of the State of New York, and County Fire Coordinators Association of the State of New York to make this program possible.

Carbon Monoxide Can Be Deadly

You can't see or smell carbon monoxide, but at high levels it can kill a person in minutes. Carbon monoxide is produced whenever any fuel such as gas, oil, kerosene, wood, or charcoal is burned. If appliances that burn fuel are maintained and used properly, the amount of CO produced is usually not hazardous. However, if appliances are not working properly or are used incorrectly, dangerous levels of CO can result. Hundreds of people die accidentally every year from CO poisoning caused by malfunctioning or improperly used fuel-burning appliances. Even more die from CO produced by idling cars. Fetuses, infants, elderly people, and people with anemia or with a history of heart or respiratory disease can be especially susceptible. Be safe, install a CO detector on each level in your home within 15 feet of each bedroom. SWIMMING POOLS & OTHER REQUIRED PERMITS

Summer is right around the corner and soon we will all want a swimming pool to cool off in. If you are planning on installing a pool this summer please remember that ANY swimming pool over 2 feet high requires a permit and inspections to meet the New York State Building Code. Also please make note that inflatable swimming pools and pools with plastic sides do not meet the State Code requirements of a "strong sided" pool and need additional items such as fencing 48" high with a latching gate. Other items that need further consideration are filter pumps and any electrical service installed in connection with the pool. Both need an inspection from a UL electrical inspector. Lastly, the physical location of the pool has to meet the zoning set back regulations.

Also please check for other permit requirements such as roofing, siding, heating systems, hot water tanks, etc.. Please remember to obtain your permit before starting work to avoid complications and additional fees. We understand that permits can sometimes be a nuisance, but they are for everyone's safety and well being. To learn more about the different types of permits required, you can pick up a pamphlet from the Village Office.
